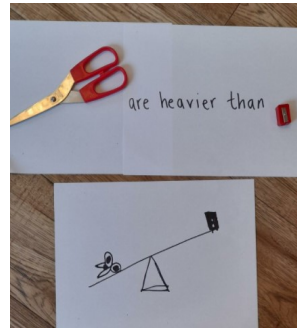

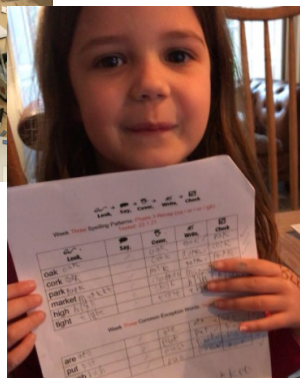
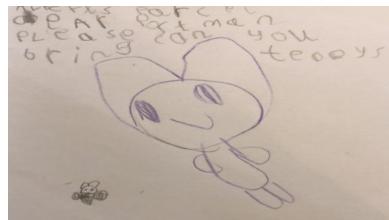


The Saplings
