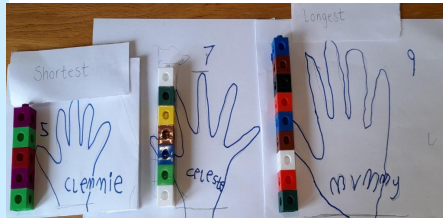

**Tuesday 13th April—Return to school**

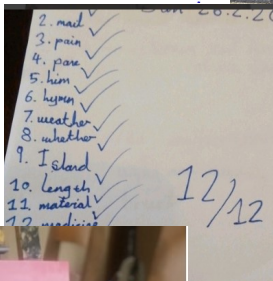
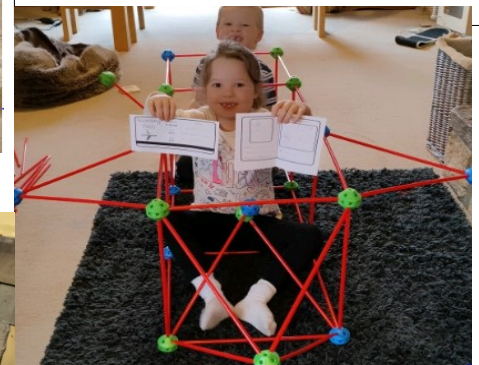
### The Acorns

We have looked at some rhyming stories to support our work on phonics this week with a focus on ai and ee. In Science the children learnt how to look after their teeth and we are continuing to explore number bonds to 9 and 10 in Maths! It's been a superb week of learning so well done everyone!

The imagination and creativity in school and at home in this geography lesson was a joy to behold.
